Over two seasons, they went 59-0, and 11 players on their rosters went off to Division I programs. Four would become future NBA players: David Wingate, Reggie Williams, Tyrone Muggsy Bogues and Reggie Lewis, three of them making history by getting selected together in the first round of the 1987 draft.
