Letter from the Director

The year 2005 saw the formation of SOURCE, the tri-school community service and volunteerism center on the Johns Hopkins University East Baltimore campus. Aided by student organizations, the Governing Board and the Community Council, the SOURCE made significant advances over the past year in supporting students, faculty, and staff; enhancing our programs and facilities; and strengthening relationships with Baltimore community-based organizations (CBOs).

This year, SOURCE produced significant progress in our community outreach initiatives, including some of the following programs: UNICEF partnership, "The Connection" community consultant group, SOM Physician and Society course, SON Community Outreach Program, and the JHSPH student group: SPARC (Students for a Positive Academic paRtnership with the East Baltimore Community).

While our continual successes are many, there is still much progress needed to improve academic-community relations and student involvement opportunities. We continue to be challenged in the areas of: funding, staffing, and academic integration. By exchanging ideas and working together, SOURCE is catalyzing change and implementing effective programs in East Baltimore.

History of SOURCE

Opened in January 2005 with support from the Johns Hopkins University Schools of Medicine, Nursing, and Public Health, the Student Outreach Resource Center (SOURCE) is the centerpiece of the East Baltimore campus' community engagement initiative. SOURCE was formed to satisfy the need for a single interdisciplinary community service and volunteerism center that could coordinate volunteer activities and reduce duplication of effort and services. The SOURCE has a particular, but not exclusive, focus on East Baltimore neighborhoods near the Johns Hopkins Medical Institutions.

The SOURCE serves as the clearinghouse for requests from community agencies for volunteer services and as the focal point for students in East Baltimore who seek volunteer exposure in an urban environment. The SOURCE is also available to help identify and coordinate community services. Some of these opportunities offer academic credit or a stipend or both, and qualified work-study students may apply their funding toward community service employment. Through a variety of involvement opportunities, SOURCE encourages members of the JHU East Baltimore campus to be responsible and engaged citizens who demonstrate the ideals of service, academic excellence, and concern for the whole person.

Since the SOURCE serves multiple schools within Johns Hopkins University, a complex governing structure was created to ensure that the center appropriately serves students, faculty, and staff from the Schools of Medicine, Nursing, and Public Health, as well all of its partnering community-based organizations. A governing board, which also includes an executive committee, and a community council have been formed to advise and direct the center's activities.

The SOURCE aims to provide both professional and personal development through reciprocal learning in partnership with our community-based organizations. The efforts that the SOURCE has made to reach this goal are outlined here in our inaugural annual report.

Student Outreach Resource Center (SOURCE)

Resources and Services

Annual Volunteer Fair In September of each year, CBOs set up display booths and acquaint students, faculty and staff with potential field experiences and collaborative research projects.

CBO Partnership Those in the SOURCE network of partnering CBOs receive exposure and/or participation in all of SOURCE's programs. In addition, volunteer management and recruitment consultation is available from SOURCE staff.

Charity/Donation Drives Ongoing charity drives are conducted throughout the year to benefit the community.

Community Service Awards These are given to students who have performed outstanding service with a CBO. Nominations are accepted each year in April, during National Volunteer Week.

Community Tours Community leaders take potential volunteers on scheduled tours through the East Baltimore neighborhood to familiarize students with the community. Both walking and bus tours are available, particularly around Orientation time.

Monthly CBO Seminar Series Seminars familiarize students with the work done by CBOs and encourage collaboration between students and the community.

National Volunteer Week In April, SOURCE plans a weeklong calendar of events in celebration of National Volunteer Week. Service projects and CBO seminars are organized.

On-Line CBO Directory The SOURCE website is available 24 hours a day/7 days a week to assist individuals in finding meaningful service opportunities. Our online directory of partnering CBOs is organized into a variety of categories and also includes a search feature to aid in locating appropriate CBO opportunities.

One-Time Service Projects SOURCE coordinates one-time service projects for those who lack the time to volunteer more frequently.

Reflection/Evaluation Form This online tool is used to assist in tracking student involvement experiences and evaluating partnerships with CBOs. Students self-report their hours, job responsibilities, and feelings regarding their experiences.

Resource Room The SOURCE Resource Room is located in the School of Public Health (615 N. Wolfe St). The room includes: tables and chairs for small group meetings, literature racks, files on all partnering CBOs, and maps of Baltimore. The Resource Room is particularly useful for service-based student organizations. Student groups use the room's mailboxes to receive and send phone messages and faxes, store materials, collect items, and use the computer and printer.

Student Volunteer Recruitment Kit During the summer months, all partnering CBOs receive a Student Volunteer Recruitment Kit. This booklet describes the needs, schedules, and desires of our special student populations. Additionally, academic programs that encourage/require community involvement are outlined.

Tri-School Days of Service In both the Fall and Spring terms, SOURCE hosts Tri-School Days of Service. Students from all 3 Schools volunteer to participate in simple one-time service projects. Approximately 6-8 projects are organized on the same day, and large scale marketing efforts encouraging students to give a day to the community.

Volunteer Celebration At the end of April, during National Volunteer Week, all students who have reported their community involvement experiences with the SOURCE are invited to a Volunteer Celebration and Luncheon. Certificates are given to recognize students for their efforts.

Weekly Service Scoop An email service sent to subscribers once a week that is used to identify, catalog, and disseminate information on opportunities for community involvement, including one-time projects, special studies, capstones, internships, federal work-study, conferences, grants and on-going volunteer positions.

Special Accomplishments**The Connection (community consultant group)**

Students from across the three Schools came together to create a new option for working with CBOs. Students had the desire and passion to collaborate with CBOs, but lacked the time to make a long-term commitment. Based on this notion, the SOURCE and a committee of students formed “The Connection,” a community consultant group. CBOs are able to request small teams of consultants to work on short-term projects in the areas of: strategic consulting, fundraising strategy, performance measurement, and communications consulting. The Connection consists of approximately 40 students from across the three Schools. We are currently piloting this program, and six consulting teams are in the process of working on projects, including:

- Writing a community block grant with the Men’s Center
- Creating by-laws for the Environmental Justice Partnership for their 501(c)3 application
- Conducting a needs assessment for the International Rescue Committee’s refugee population
- Creating a resource guide for newly arrived refugees with the International Rescue Committee
- Designing a program on healthy food choices for families with the YMCA
- Conduct an evaluation of several youth programs coordinated by the Greater Homewood Community Corporation

At this point in time, the student projects are underway. The SOURCE has received a great deal of positive feedback, both from the students involved in consulting and the CBOs receiving the services. Several other projects are currently lined up for the start of 2006.

In the future, the SOURCE would like to see a possibility of having students earn special studies credits for their participation and/or small stipends for participation.

Partnership for a Healthier East Baltimore (PHEB)

The Johns Hopkins University Urban Health Institute (UHI), SOM, SON, JHSPH, the University of Maryland Dental School, and the Environmental Justice Partnership Community Board (EJB) have formed a partnership and are working with the Baltimore City Health Department (BCHD) to carry out a community based health needs assessment (Chan) to assess the health and health care needs of the residents of East Baltimore (EB). The partnership is called the Partnership for a Healthier East Baltimore (PHEB). The goal of the health needs assessment is to improve the health of the population of EB by documenting their health status, assessing their unmet

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health care needs and mobilizing the health care community to deliver needed curative and preventive services, to pursue relevant health-related research and translate research into policies.

The SOURCE is a key member of the PHEB. Through the SOURCE's involvement, student involvement opportunities will be developed and distributed. Additionally, the SOURCE will be a mechanism of communicating the goals and opportunities available with the PHEB to the community (through SOURCE's network of CBOs).

UNICEF Partnership

The J.B. Grant International Health Society and the SOURCE have partnered with UNICEF (the United Nation Children's Fund) to develop educational programs for young students in Baltimore schools. The SOURCE serves as a permanent liaison to the UNICEF office in order to create continuity and a "home office" for the student volunteers. Through the SOURCE linkage, the volunteer program will reach out to partnering public schools, after-school programs, and other youth-serving organizations. Students from the SOM, SON, and SPH have already begun to teach about global public health issues that impact children in area public schools.

Partnership with MICA

In 2005, through its connection with the Environmental Justice Partnership, the SOURCE began a working relationship with the Maryland Institute College of Art's (MICA) Bernard Canniffe, chair of the Graphic Design Department. Students in Canniffe's graphic design course were involved in developing several successful projects for SOURCE, including the SOURCE logo, an advertising postcard, a series of internal recruitment posters, and a computer video highlighting Hopkins student volunteer experiences with the Men's Center (one of the SOURCE's partnering CBOs). The MICA team applied its artistic skills to communicate messages in a manner that is informative and creative. This successful relationship was rewarding to all parties involved.

SON - Community Outreach Program

The JHU SON Community Outreach Program provides community health nursing services to individuals, families, communities, and populations in several underserved areas around Baltimore and in other selected communities. Students who choose to participate in the Community Outreach Program are placed in selected community agencies. In 2005, the SOURCE was essential to the placement process for the SON Community Outreach Program. Due to the popularity and increased enrollment numbers for the program, additional assistance was needed to work through the elaborate process of matching students with community agencies. In partnership with Lori Edwards, the faculty member that oversees the SON Community Outreach Program, the SOURCE placed approximately 70 SON students with CBOs. Additionally, the SOURCE Director brought 9 new CBOs into the SON Community Outreach Program to add more opportunities for involvement to the established partnerships.

SOM - Physicians and Society Course

All 120 first year medical students take Dr. Ogborn's Physicians and Society course. As a course component, Dr. Ogborn has always required students to be involved in the East Baltimore community for several hours every week. However, students were left to decipher the options on their own. In 2005, the SOURCE partnered with Dr. Ogborn to provide more resources and recommendations to the students in her course. The SOURCE Director and Community Consultant guest lectured at the start of the Fall term to present information about the community. Additionally, eight separate site visits were organized and successfully completed by the first year class.

JHSPH - Students for a Positive Academic paRtnership with the East Baltimore Community (SPARC)

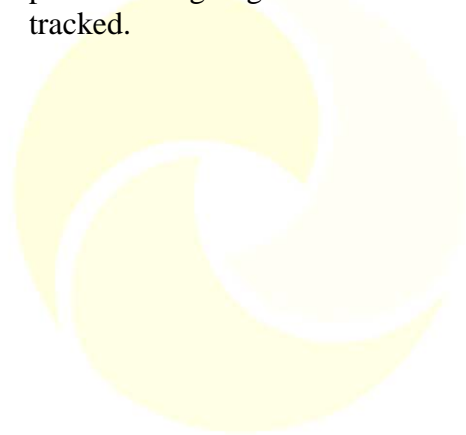
SPARC is a student advocacy group formed to promote institutional changes that will harness JHSPH's resources for the benefit of the East Baltimore community, while providing much needed public health practice opportunities for students. One of SPARC's primary goals is to increase students' opportunities for public health practice and community-based participatory research in community settings. The SOURCE assisted this student group in a variety of ways, including: group formation, survey design, survey dissemination, data collection, advising, preparing a report and recommendations, advertising, printing costs, and connections to upper administration. SPARC was able to speak out about its issues at a JHSPH Student Assembly Town Hall event, a meeting with the Senior Associate Dean for Academic Affairs, and a Deans for Students Network meeting. The group continues to meet on a regular basis in order to continue its objectives to disseminate the results of their work and gain support, and to bring about a change in the JHSPH curriculum for the benefit of the students and the East Baltimore community.

Other Notable Accomplishments:

- Security Task Force – an adhoc committee was set up to discuss the safety of our students when volunteering in the community. Issues including transportation, liability, and safety are being explored.
- UHI Executive Committee – The SOURCE Director has been asked to sit on this university-wide committee.
- Executive Committee for Interdepartmental Applied Public Health Program in JHSPH – The SOURCE Director serves on this School-wide committee.
- JHSPH Sommer Scholars – SOURCE worked with this group to create a mentoring program with a local elementary school. The program will officially begin in January 2006.
- SON Class Service Project – assisted students in coordinating the event
- SOM Human Genetics Department - assisted in coordinating a service project
- SON Student National Medical Association – assisted students in coordinating a service project

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- JHSPH Anna Baetjer Society – assisted students in coordinating a service project and finding CBOs for on-going partnerships
- United Way Campaign – SOURCE highlighted all of its partnering CBOs within United Way for the University campaign
- Rape Aggression Defense – The SOURCE Director is a certified Rape Aggression Defense (RAD) instructor. After working with Legal Counsel, Risk Management, and Corporate Security, approval to bring RAD courses to campus was given in December 2005. Plans are underway (in partnership with a SON certified RAD instructor) to offer RAD in the upcoming year.
- Community Referrals – As SOURCE has come to be recognized by CBOs as a community resource, the SOURCE provides on-going referrals within the community and Hopkins. In 2005, 47 community referrals for services needed were tracked.

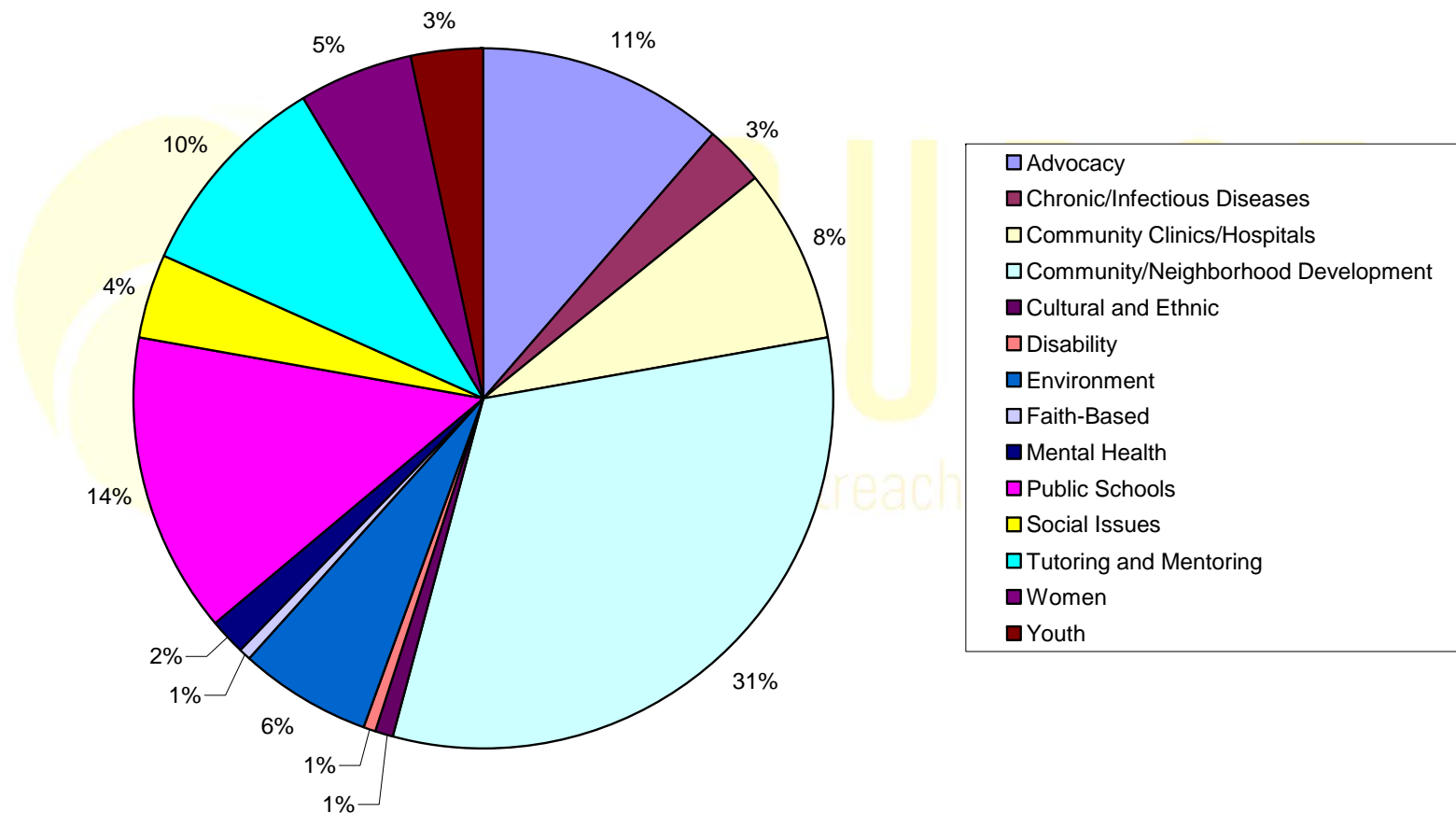

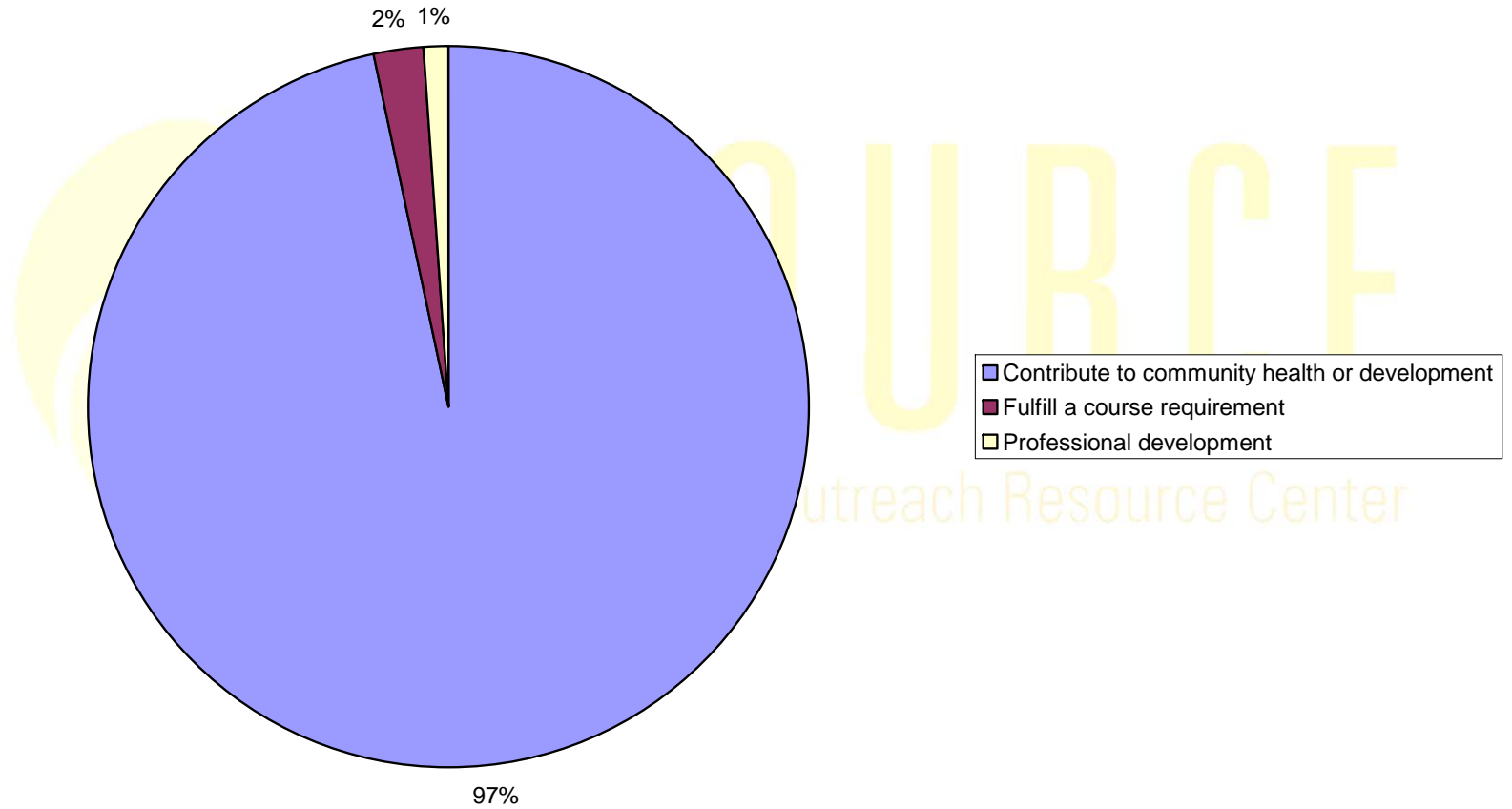
