SOURCE Annual Report
2009-2010 Academic Year

The 2009-2010 school year marked SOURCE's fifth full academic year of operation. Throughout the past five years, SOURCE has become a recognizable entity both on-campus and in the community. SOURCE continues to experience growth in the requests it receives from students, faculty, and community groups. This annual report summarizes the wealth of accomplishments in relation to SOURCE's mission of "providing academic, professional and personal development opportunities for the members of the JHU Schools of Medicine, Nursing, and Public Health through community outreach and service-learning partnerships with community-based organizations."

In 2009-2010, SOURCE was staffed by 3 full-time professionals (Director, Assistant Director, Administrative Coordinator), 1 part-time AmeriCorps*VISTA, 1 student worker, and the contractual Community Consultant. The student worker, paid for by the JHSPH OPHPT through the FWS program, was a brand new position for SOURCE. An MPH candidate was recruited during Summer 2009 to fill the position. She was hired to assist with the Baltimore Community Practicum course as well as the Connection Community Consultant Program. Her role was critical to further supporting these two growing programs. Her services were particularly important while SOURCE's Director was out on maternity leave (July 2009 – October 2009). The AmeriCorps*VISTA was also a brand new position for SOURCE. This part-time position came together last minute, through a collaboration with Homewood's CSC and the MDCC. The VISTA's role was mainly to support the service-learning infrastructure at SOURCE. The start of the academic year was especially busy, as the Director went out on maternity leave while 2 new staffers started at SOURCE at perhaps the busiest time of the year.

Goals and Accomplishments from 2009-2010:

1. **Build All aBoard! – board referral service**
For the past 2 years, SOURCE staff and SOURCE Governing Board member Lainie Rutkow (faculty in JHSPH, HPM) have been exploring the possibility of creating a board matching service at Hopkins. This would be an opportunity for long-term students, staff, and faculty to be recruited to serve on non-profits boards. The concept came about following the success of the Connection Community Consultants Program. SOURCE's Community Council has supported the concept, and agreed that this would be a need. However, an April 2008 survey monkey to gather additional details from all CBOs received a low response rate (even from SOURCE's own Community Council). While the concept and background information is still pulled together, SOURCE was not able to get this program up and running as of yet. This initiative has been tabled.

2. **Continue to increase collaboration with new groups**
Because reaching out to new groups is a constant focus for SOURCE, the center continued to purposefully collaborate with different groups across Hopkins. During the year, some of the new relationships and collaborations included:
 - Qualitative Research course series at JHSPH, International Health
 - East Baltimore Food Systems course at JHSPH
 - East Baltimore Film Series, across campus, sponsored by SOM's Dr. Gibbs
 - Child Health Society (new student group at JHSPH)
 - School of Education (discussions regarding tutoring and mentoring)
 - School of Business (through HOP-SIP)
 - School of Nursing (Dr. Deborah Jones) and the East Baltimore Health Fair

- 3. Continue to improve HIV Counseling and Testing Program**
2009-2010 marked the third year of SOURCE's HIV Counseling and Testing Program. This year, several new activities enhanced the program. HIV Program Information Sessions were held in early September, in order to spread the word about the program, different sites, as well as requirements. Additional mandatory reflection activities (both in-person and written) were offered. This year, following a change in staff at People's Community Health Centers (one of SOURCE's 3 community clinic sites for the HIV Program), the program experienced a long list of problems at this particular site. Numerous conversations occurred, both by phone and in-person, with the leadership of People's. Several attempts to remedy the situation were made. But ultimately, the site was not able to meet its mutual expectations. Therefore, we have jointly decided not to continue partnering with People's through the HIV Program.
- 4. Further develop the role of SOURCE's various governance structures' members**
In order to hold SOURCE governing board members more accountable, SOURCE implemented an activities tracking system for student leaders. With the successful launch of this new tracking mechanism, SOURCE student governing board members were much more involved and reliable than in recent history.
- 5. Properly Train New SOURCE Team Members**
SOURCE welcomed several new staff members during 2009-2010. SOURCE's Administrative Coordinator, Cherise Roberts, began employment with SOURCE in late March 2008. Therefore, she had only been a part of SOURCE's Team for 90 days before the 2009-2010 academic year. SOURCE also hired a new Federal Work-Study (FWS) student, Aita Amaize, to work 8 hrs per week at SOURCE. She supported the Connection Community Consultant Program as well as the Baltimore Community Practicum Course. Finally, SOURCE hired a part-time (20 hrs per week) AmeriCorps *VISTA, Jennifer Yogi. Ms. Yogi split her time between Homewood's Center for Social Concern and SOURCE. She focused her efforts on community-based learning activities, and creating materials for interested faculty, community preceptors and student leaders. At the conclusion of Ms. Yogi's VISTA year, she had completed a draft of several online modules to help prepare students to work in the community. Additional work is needed to fine tune the modules before recording.
- 6. Explore other avenues to fund SOURCE's staffing needs**
SOURCE's continued growth and success has also brought additional strain to the small operation. With only three full-time permanent staff, it has become increasingly difficult to keep up with growing demands. SOURCE is in need of additional staff to continue to expand services. SOURCE's Director has had several meetings with Development Officers within the schools. However, development officers have indicated that raising funds to support staff members is the most difficult type of fundraising. SOURCE programming budget is about \$25,000 per year. Raising funds to support all programs would still not cover a full-time employee. Additional support and conversations with school leaders and development are still needed to put SOURCE's needs on the development agenda.

SOURCE Goals for 2010-2011

1. Develop the Health Ambassadors Initiative

A new AmeriCorps*VISTA was hired for the 2010-2011 academic year. Armella Gilbert will be responsible for organizing the new "Health Ambassadors" program. This is a joint position between SOURCE and the CSC. This program is closely modeled after SOURCE's HIV Counseling and Testing Program. Participating community schools (including Tench Tilghman Elementary/Middle and Waverly) will be the host sites for regular community health education sessions in the evenings for community residents. Health education topics will be determined with the schools, and students will be trained to offer health education workshops. Faculty from across Hopkins, several partner CBOs, and students will join forces to offer this new program.

2. Improve SOURCE's Communication Efforts

With countless ways for Hopkins to participate in community initiatives, coupled with increasing inquiries for engagement, SOURCE needs to continue to spread its message through diverse mechanisms using its existing staff structure. Several communication systems will be utilized during 2010-2011, including:

- *Social media:* Facebook and Twitter accounts are active
- *Online webinars:* Using Adobe Connect (free service) to offer online webinars to community partners. Online webinars will be used to offer orientations for preceptors, educate the community about new initiatives, and more
- *Student governing board:* Student governing board members will be asked to send out messages regarding SOURCE initiatives. That way, we aim to reduce the "email fatigue" when too many messages are sent from the same email address.

3. Continue with Academic Integration Activities

Students continue to express interest in working with the community through for-credit academic offerings. SOURCE will continue to work with faculty to provide academic service-learning assistance for various courses. New courses for 2010-2011 that are currently being discussed include: "Program Planning for Health Behavior Change" and "Health Literacy." More connections are also being made with MHS internship coordinators within various JHSPH departments. After supporting the SOM's new Scholarly Concentrations program in 2009-2010, this collaboration will continue. SOURCE will also continue to form relationships with various faculty within the 3 schools. This will assist in raising awareness, identifying faculty allies, and understanding SOURCE's role in supporting community-based professional development opportunities for students.

SOURCE Resources and Services

Annual Community Involvement Fair In September of each year, CBOs set up display booths and acquaints students, faculty and staff with potential field experiences and collaborative research projects.

Baltimore Week In October of each year, SOURCE works in conjunction with a variety of student groups to host Baltimore Week – a weeklong introduction to the city and relevant health issues.

CBO Partnerships Those in SOURCE's network of partnering CBOs receive exposure and/or participation in all of SOURCE's programs. In addition, volunteer management and recruitment consultation is available from SOURCE staff. SOURCE has established an application process for CBOs that wish to become recognized SOURCE partners (including Mutual Expectations of Partners and Criteria for Partnering CBOs).

Charity/Donation Drives Four separate charity drives are conducted throughout the year to benefit CBOs within SOURCE's network (food, winter accessories, book, toiletry) in collaboration with student groups, departments, and other university entities.

Community Service Awards These awards are given to students, student groups, faculty, and community preceptors who have performed outstanding service with a CBO. Nominations are accepted each year in March, and awardees are announced during National Volunteer Week in April.

Community Tours SOURCE's Community Consultant, a long-time community leader, takes potential volunteers on scheduled tours through the East Baltimore neighborhood to familiarize students with the community. Both walking and bus tours are available, particularly during the Orientation season.

Connection Community Consultant Program Each year, SOURCE recruits students from all 3 schools to serve as volunteer consultants. Small teams of students work on short-term projects identified by community partners.

HIV Counseling and Testing Program SOURCE has organized an HIV Counseling and Testing Program. SOURCE recruits students to go through the state certification process for HIV Counseling and Testing. Accepted students must commit to serving as on-going volunteers at participating community clinic sites.

Monthly CBO Seminar Series Seminars familiarize students, faculty, and staff with the work done by CBOs and encourage collaboration between Hopkins and the community.

National Volunteer Week In April, SOURCE plans a weeklong calendar of events in celebration of National Volunteer Week. Service projects and CBO seminars are organized.

On-Line CBO Directory SOURCE's website is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week to assist individuals in finding meaningful service opportunities. Our online directory of partnering CBOs is organized into a variety of categories and also includes a search feature to aid in locating appropriate CBO opportunities.

One-Time Service Projects SOURCE coordinates one-time service projects for those who lack the time to volunteer more frequently.

Reflection/Evaluation Form This online tool is used to assist in tracking student involvement experiences and evaluating partnerships with CBOs. Students self-report their hours, job responsibilities, and feelings regarding their experiences.

Student Advising SOURCE schedules meetings with students that are interested in a variety of community involvement opportunities. Students are assisted with: identifying CBOs and projects of interest, clarifying service-learning components of courses, developing customized internships, connecting to CBOs for fellowship and scholarship opportunities, and more.

Student Group Advising SOURCE works with student groups and organizations within all three Schools. Students are assisted with: special event planning, service projects, community speakers, grants and other funding opportunities, and more.

Student Resource Space SOURCE maintains a variety of resources that are available for usage related to community involvement: literature racks, files on all partnering CBOs, maps of Baltimore. Resources that are particularly useful for service-based student organizations include: student group mailboxes, fax machine, telephone, computer station, storage space, and a printer.

Student Recruitment Kit During the summer months, all partnering CBOs receive a Student Recruitment Kit. This booklet describes the needs, schedules, and desires of our special student populations. Additionally, academic programs that encourage/require community involvement are outlined. This kit is updated for each academic school year.

Tri-School Days of Service In both the Fall and Spring terms, SOURCE hosts Tri-School Days of Service. Students from all 3 Schools volunteer to participate in simple one-time service projects. Approximately 6-8 projects are organized on the same day and large scale marketing efforts encourage students to give a day to the community.

Volunteer Celebration At the end of April, during National Volunteer Week, all students who have reported their community involvement experiences with SOURCE are invited to a Volunteer Celebration and Luncheon. Certificates are given to recognize students for their efforts.

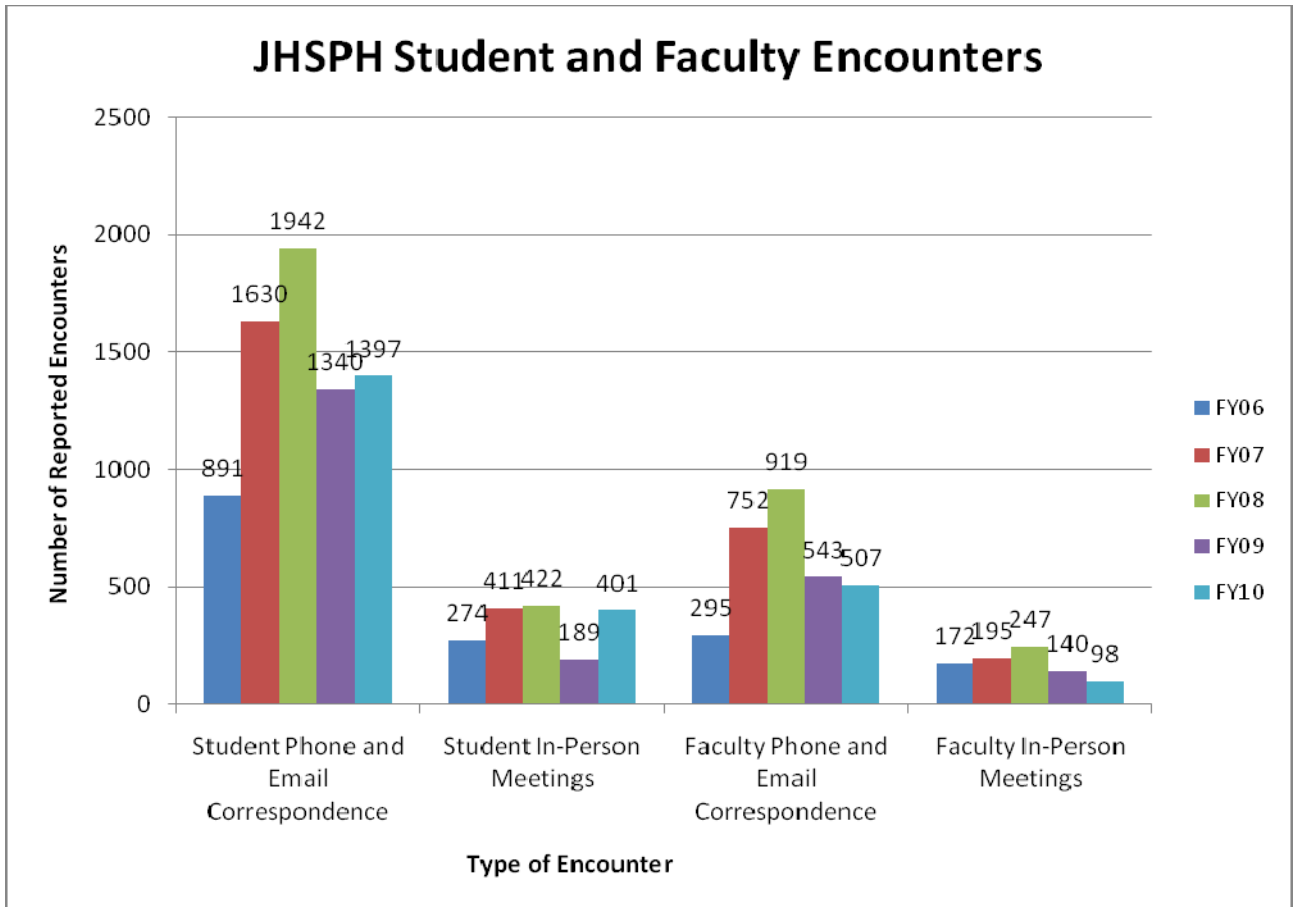

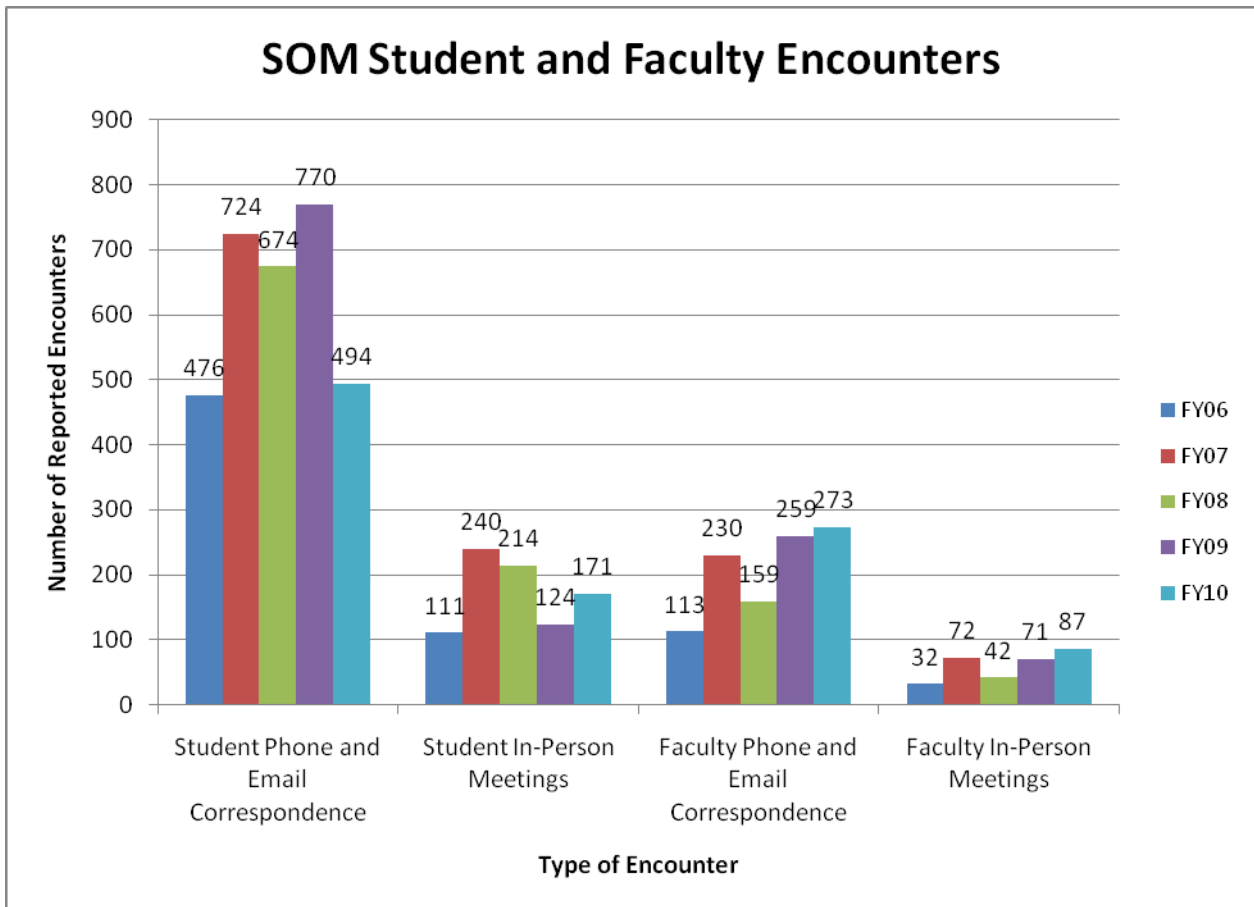

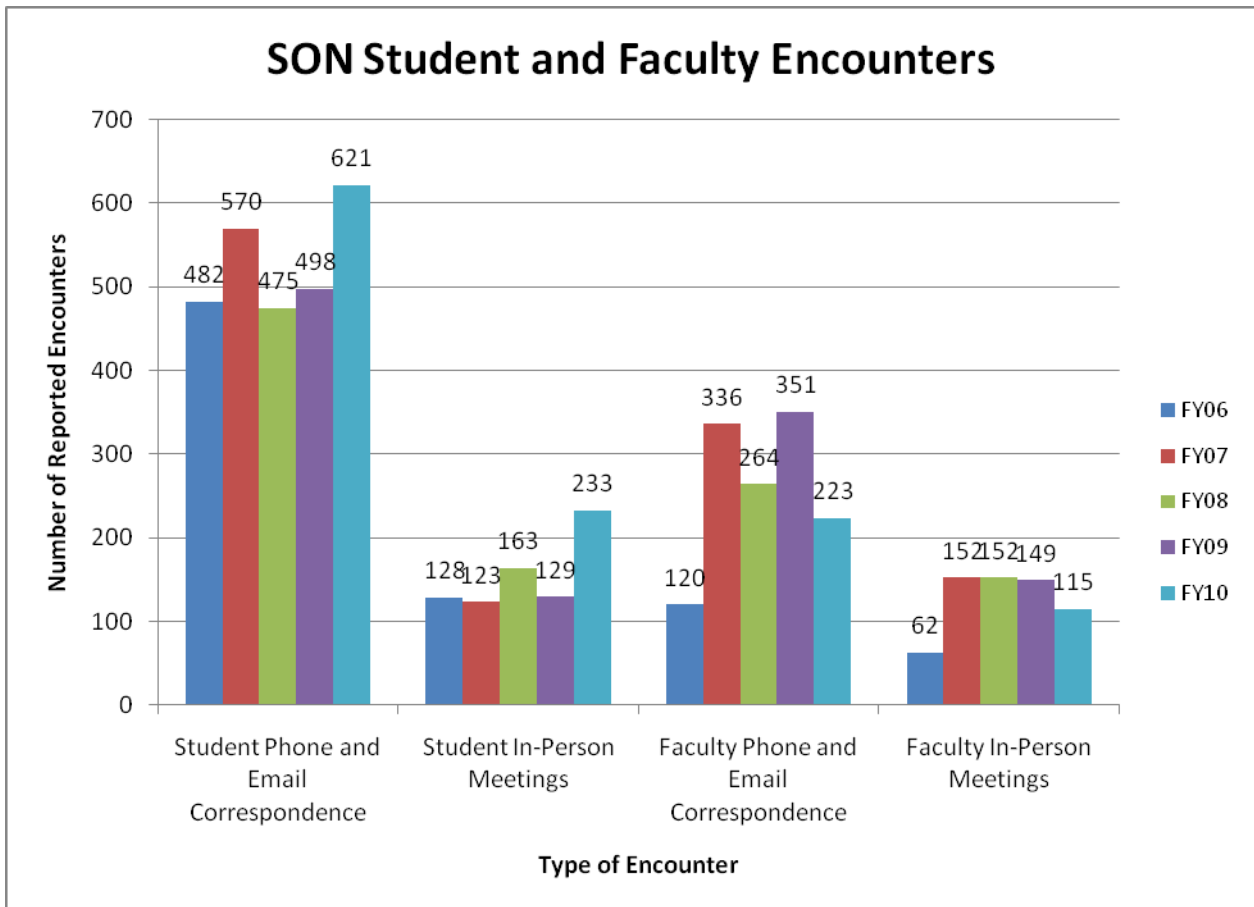

Community Outreach Program

During the 2009-2010 school year, SOURCE's Director continued to work closely with SON faculty member Patty Wilson to assist in placing nursing students in CBOs for practical experiences as a part of the SON Community Outreach Program (COP). Wilson and Levin are the coordinators for the SON COP. In order to participate in the COP, all students must complete NR100.426 Community Outreach to Underserved Populations in Urban Baltimore. The complex COP placement process requires a great deal of time, and consists of some of the following steps:

- Educate CBOs about the program and requirements.
- Gather, fine tune, and approve CBO job descriptions.
- Provide info sessions for students
- Students submit applications, ranking their preferred job placements.
- Secure FWS contracts with CBOs.
- Match students with jobs at CBOs.

- Offer SON COP Orientations and Trainings
- Placements are altered due to scheduling and other conflicts.
- Students report their activities through an online activities log.
- Maintain documents within the SON portal to track students' activities.
- Host monthly required reflective sessions with students.
- Review written reflective assignments.
- Improve training, orientation, and outreach materials.

At the completion of the academic school year, SOURCE's Director works to report the summary statistics for the COP. Some of the key data includes:

- **92** students reported their experiences through the online log (vs. 54 students in 2008-2009)
- **30** CBOs were served (vs. 19 CBOs in 2008-2009 year)
- **3,709** hours of service were reportedly contributed in the community (vs. **1,009** in 2008-2009)

SOURCE relies on students to self-report their community involvement experiences. This information does not capture the full picture of students' community involvement. Quarterly announcements were sent to all students via student listservs in each of the three Schools which requested students to fill out our online feedback and reflection form. Other students were involved in community activities, but failed to report this information through SOURCE's online forms.

*In order to provide a better sense of the overall numbers of students and hours committed to the community, we provide the following data that has been collected by other sources. Combined with the information collected through SOURCE, these numbers help to better illustrate our involvement numbers. We are unable to account for other unreported hours. 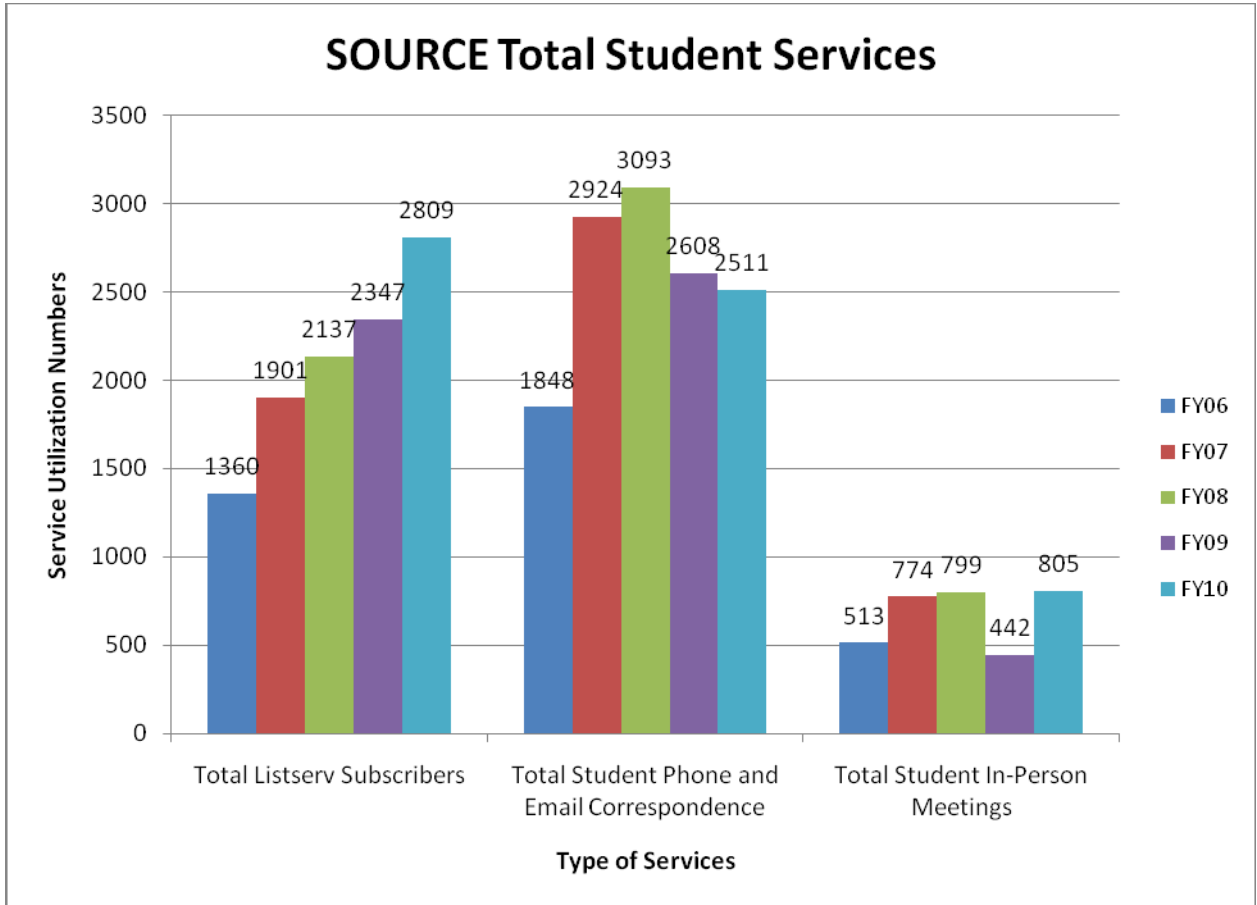

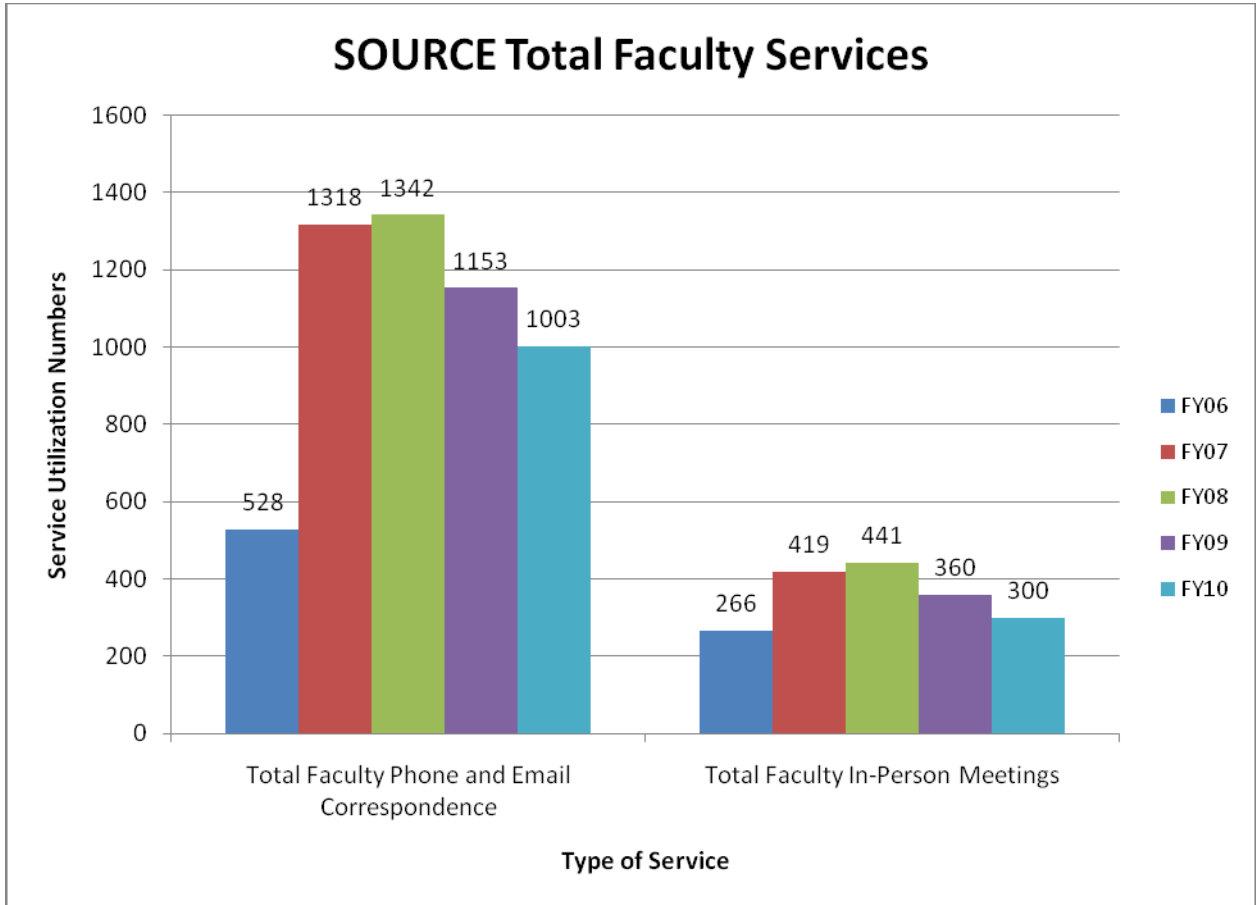

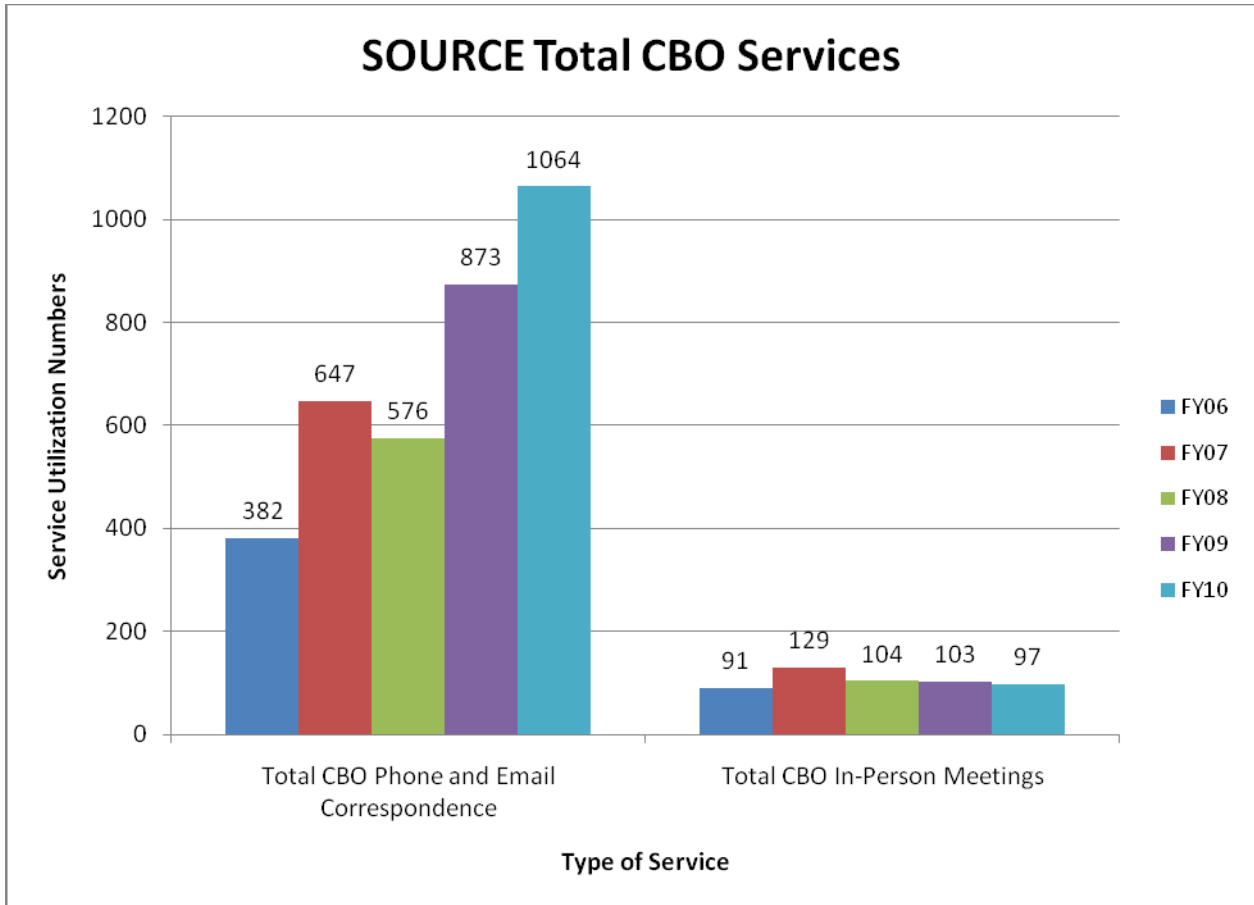

The Connection Community Consultant Group 2009-2010 Projects

SquashWise

Description: SquashWise works with 6th-8th grade students, providing instruction in the sport of squash as well as an intensive tutoring and academic enrichment curriculum. We have secured a grant this year, and part of it involves the implementation of a nutrition education curriculum. We would love to work with a group of public health, nursing, or medical student(s) with nutrition education experience, especially among adolescents. (Estimated time commitment: Planning should take 1-2 weeks. Implementation will be part of a longer unit on nutrition and fitness that will run 5-6 weeks in length. It is up to the team and their schedule as to how long they have to implement the curriculum.)

Project: This year, Squashwise secured a grant that involved the implementation of a nutrition education curriculum. The Connection team developed an age-appropriate nutrition curriculum that could be implemented over a 6- to 8-week during the regular academic sessions that are already in place. For each module, students designed lesson plans, developed handouts, and devised a budget. After the project's conclusion, team members worked with SOURCE to recruit other students to help with the implementation of the curriculum. City Steps

Description: AIRS has developed a range of programming under the CITY STEPS banner that addresses the specific problems of transition-aged homeless youth ages 14-24. Interventions at such a critical time in life have the capacity to be transforming, and in so doing, prevent future episodes of homelessness or exposure to trauma.

Project: The Connection team put together a comprehensive list of funding sources to support programming for non-residential services (particularly Life Skills) for homeless and unstably-housed youth.

Connection team: 1 JHSPH students; 1 SON student

Students Sharing Coalition

Description: Students Sharing Coalition, Inc. (SSC) is a nonprofit organization that facilitates students breaking down stereotypes and boundaries, improving low-income communities, developing self-esteem and leadership, learning about social issues, and becoming role models and leaders for the next generation.

Project: SSC needed assistance in assessing its current programmatic strengths and weaknesses as well as a re-worked logic model to strengthen future grant applications. The Connection team reviewed evaluation overviews, current/past grant applications and other salient information to determine current strengths and weaknesses. The team also made recommendations to SSC for future evaluation efforts.

Connection team: 4 JHSPH students; 1 SOM student

The Men's Center

Description: The Men's Center provides a wide range of services to men, including parenting and life skills, rites of passage, health education, and job placement assistance.

Project: The Connection Team helped the Men's Center put together a grant application to the Abell Foundation to help implement one component of their newly-revitalized comprehensive male service package: Rites of Passage for young adults (17- 25 year olds). Deliverables included a cover letter, the letter of intent, and the proposal narrative itself.

Connection team: 6 JHSPH students

House of Ruth

Description: The House of Ruth Maryland (HRM) is one of the nation's leading domestic violence centers, helping thousands of battered women and their children find the safety and security that so many of us take for granted. HRM provides the following services: emergency shelter, transitional housing, hotel placements for men, legal aid clinic, counseling, abuser intervention programs, teen programs, and a hotline.

Project: The HRM needed assistance with literature review and research for statistics and information they could use in grant applications. Of particular interest was research pertaining to children that witness violence, effectiveness of abuser intervention programs, and general statistical information about the prevalence of domestic violence across genders, races, socioeconomic statuses, and the state of Maryland. Through the work of the Connection Team, HRM was able to benefit from comprehensive research tools available to JHU students.

Connection team: 6 JHSPH students

Incentive Mentoring Program

Description: The Incentive Mentoring Program (IMP) is a non-profit organization that provides intensive academic and social support to Baltimore City teenagers who are in immediate danger of being expelled from high-school.

Project: In order to assess the progress of their students, IMP implemented a "log system" where their volunteers would record all of their encounters with the mentees, no matter how miniscule the activity. This system worked until the time they decided to create an annual report that required quantitative data. They needed assistance in evaluating these logs for the 2008-2009 year and to see if they could acquire quantifiable data. The Connection helped IMP analyze the data in the logs and created a report with quantitative and qualitative components. The types of data included the number of hours spent for various activities and quantifiable indicators of the quality of interaction between mentee and mentor.

Connection team: 1 JHSPH student

Baltimore American Indian Center

Description: The Baltimore American Indian Center (BAIC) was organized in the late 1960s to meet the needs of Native Americans in the region and to serve as a focal point for cultural, social, and traditional tribal activities. Over the last 40 years, BAIC has operated programs that address the socio-economic, educational, health, and cultural concerns of its members.

Project: The Connection team developed a needs assessment survey to provide BAIC with information on the health status and needs of their target population. This survey will be distributed at a community event at a later date.

Connection team: 3 JHSPH students; 1 SON student

People's Community Health Centers

Description: The People's Community Health Center (PCHC) is a network of nine federally-qualified health centers in Baltimore City and County. They provide primary care services for individuals with incomes below 200% of the federal poverty level and no health insurance.

Project: The Connection team developed a strategic plan for social media marketing. They assess social networking utilities and provided a comparative analysis of available media that may be used by PCHC. Working with PCHC, the team identified systems and organizations with which they had existing relationships and assessed the environment through which they could electronically interact with these organizations. The team identified social networking practices of similar health care organizations, provided recommendations regarding type, design, and goals of social networking utilization, and developed 5 social networking sites.

Connection team: 4 JHSPH students

HEBCAC

Description: Historic East Baltimore Community Action Coalition (HEBCAC) operates several programs servicing residents throughout East Baltimore—the Youth Opportunities Center, Dee’s Place, the East Baltimore Technology Resource Center, the Monument Main Street Program, HEBCAC’s Neighborhood Services Program (see www.hebcac.org). However, they have virtually no written information, pamphlets etc. on these programs.

Project: The Connection helped craft the language and design for brochures for HEBCAC’s outreach efforts to residents, specifically the Youth Opportunities Center (YO! Center), Dee’s Place, and the East Baltimore Technology Resource Center. These brochures / fact sheets are not only informative but help market the programs to potential clients, funders, and partners.

Connection team: 2 JHSPH students

EBDI

Description: East Baltimore Development Inc. (EBDI) is a nonprofit partnership of public and private entities that works to stabilize and revitalize Middle East Baltimore by transforming the neighborhood into a thriving, healthier and economically prosperous community for families and children.

Project: The Connection team helped to write two grants for the EBDI’s East Baltimore Community School. One grant will help support literacy initiatives at the school, while the other will help provide funding for simple school supplies.
