Scholars will receive training and guidance from SOURCE staff covering the following: **critical service-learning theories ar practices, interprofessional collaboration and leadership, project and volunteer management, and delivering and reporting on outcomes**. Additionally, Scholars will engage in critical reflection practice throughout the program. These training will be delivered through the SOURCE Service Academy as well as one-on-one consultations with SOURCE staff. This opposis open to students enrolled full-time in the Schools of Public Health, Nursing, and Medicine (MD students only) during the 20 academic year. Students graduating before May 2026 are ineligible to apply.
